Key Stage 2 pupils had a fantastic time exploring space in the school hall this week. Education Group came in with some virtual reality headsets and there were screams of delight from the children as they found themselves visiting planets and seeing stars. James from Year 5 said "It was really cool to learn the names of all the planets. I felt like I was floating through space"





Safer Internet Day

It was Safer Internet Day on Tuesday. We have been working on a number of things related to this across school.

- Ladybirds learnt what a scam is. They discussed that not everything we see online is true and how we would feel if we saw something online that was not true. At the end, the children discussed what they would do if this happened to them.
- Hedgehogs learnt about different types of information, including personal information. They
 used visual cues and words to explore what is personal information and what is not. They
 had a discussion about why it is important to keep personal information private to protect
 us when we are online.
- Squirrels explored pop-ups online through story-telling. They learnt that not everything they see online is true and that sometimes, if something seems too good to be true, it probably isn't true.
- Foxes have been learning about signs of a scam for Internet Safety Day. They have defined
 what a scam is, looking at the acronym for SCAM. Then, they utilised this acronym when
 looking at examples of potential scams in small groups. Finally, they discussed who our
 trusted adults are if they stumble upon a potential scam as well as what they could do to
 remain safe.
- Badgers were learning about phishing. They explored what phishing is and what signs they
 can look out for. They then used what they learnt to feed our 'trustworthy trout' with safe
 online messages.
- Owls used all their prior knowledge to think about the best ways to protect personal
 information when using online profiles. As a class, they talked about how to keep
 themselves safe online and the different steps they can take to protect themselves from
 online scams.







PCSO Wiseman

We were also visited this week by our local PCSO Wiseman. He reinforced the learning about online when he met Year 5 and Year 6 and also talked to the whole school about anti-social behaviour. The children asked lots of questions about his work and experiences in the community.
