Creative Development	Personal and Social Development	Knowledge and Understanding of the World
<p>Art: The focus for art this term is set design. Children will explore the work of set designers in theatre, including Rae Smith, who designed the set for the theatre production of War Horse. Children will use the knowledge they have gained to make props and backgrounds.</p> 	<p>Personal, Social, Health Education: Healthy Lifestyles Children will learn a range of things that we can do to improve our health, including aspects of mental and physical health. They will focus particularly on healthy eating and physical activity, building on what they learnt in year 4.</p>	<p>Science: Children will continue looking at animals, including humans. They will learn more about the life-cycle of mammals. They will learn how to describe the changes in humans as we develop into old age.</p>
<p>Music: This term children will be continuing to learn how to play the glockenspiel. They will rehearse rhythms and explore techniques. Children will investigate pitch and create melodies by noticing the different sounds made.</p> <p>Design Technology: Children will plan, design, and create their own interactive storybooks using a variety of structures and mechanisms to bring their stories to life. Through creative use of materials, captions, and movement, they will produce engaging books to combine storytelling with design skills.</p>	 <p>Citizenship This unit covers a range of aspects of citizenship. Here, we aim to develop a child's sense of personal identity and self-worth as well as teaching them to consider and respect the needs and views of others.</p>	<p>Geography: Children will learn about hot desert biomes, including their locations, physical features, and major deserts around the world. They will explore how people use and impact deserts and compare deserts with other biomes.</p>
<p>Computing: In this unit, we will start to create vector drawings using different drawing tools to help create images. Children will see that images in vector drawings are created using shapes and lines, and each individual element in the drawing is called an object. Learners layer their objects and begin grouping and duplicating them to support the creation of more complex pieces of work.</p>	<p>RSE Year 5 will learn more about the anatomy of humans and the physical differences between male and female bodies. They will examine the changes that happen at various stages in their lives, especially during puberty.</p>	<p>History: This term, children will explore the lives of Henry VIII, his wives, and Elizabeth I by analysing portraits, written records, and historical sources. They will develop their skills in interpreting evidence, distinguishing between primary and secondary sources, and evaluating reliability.</p> <p>Religious Education: This term, we will explore the meaning and importance of the Eucharist in Christian belief and worship. Through discussion and reflection, children will consider how the Eucharist expresses core Christian values such as sacrifice, community, and remembrance.</p>

PE sessions will be taught on Tuesday and Friday. This term, children will be developing a skill set that is transferable to OAA (outdoor adventurous activities). They will work individually, collaboratively in pairs and groups to solve problems and create strategies and plans to produce the best solution to a challenge. The children will also be honing their athletics skills, including running, jumping and throwing, as well as team-based events. All good practise Sports Day later in the term!

In Year 5, we're focusing on building positive mental health through a range of activities. Pupils take part in regular mindfulness sessions, learn strategies for managing emotions, and explore the importance of kindness and resilience. We encourage open conversations, celebrate achievements, and create a safe, supportive environment where everyone feels valued and heard.

Spanish: This term we will be continuing our great progress in Spanish Language. The children will be learning new vocabulary describing objects, practising how to say what they like and don't like, and what they do.
