Update to Lunch ordering system

As parents are aware, school meals must be pre-ordered by mid-night on Saturday for the following week's meals.

Following a review of their meal ordering systems Innovate, our school lunch provider, have asked us to change the way we process meals that have not been pre-ordered. They have advised that if meals have not been pre-ordered then the following procedure will apply;

On Monday, the only lunch that they will provide will be a jacket potato. If children do not like a jacket potato, then parents will need to bring in a packed lunch. Parking

We have received complaints from our neighbours about inconsiderate parking by parents/carers as they either drop off or collect their child from school. We have received reports that parents have parked directly across driveways which has resulted in our neighbours being unable to leave their property.

Parents are reminded that parking across a dropped kerb in the UK is generally illegal and can result in a penalty charge notice (PCN), especially if it obstructs access for residents or pedestrians.

Headlice

We have been told by a number of parents that their children have head lice. Head lice and nits are very common in young children and their families. They are not caused by dirty hair and are picked up by head-to-head contact. Head lice can make your head feel itchy. Can we kindly ask all families to check your child's hair for nits over the weekend and to treat if necessary. There is no need to purchase special chemicals or head washes. Head lice and nits can be removed by wet combing. A special fine-toothed comb (detection comb) can be purchased from the local pharmacy or online. Then wash hair with ordinary shampoo and once rinsed, apply lots of conditioner (any conditioner will do). Comb the whole head of hair, using the detection comb, from the roots to the tips. This usually takes about 10 minutes for short hair, but will take longer for longer, or curly hair. When you have finished combing the hair, comb through all the hair again for a second time. Do this wet combing on days 1, 5, 9 and 13 to catch any newly hatched head lice. Check again that everyone's hair is lice free on day 17. Thank you all for taking the time to resolve this issue over the weekend.
